Make a Difference Day on Saturday is heralded annually as a "day of doing good." Across the nation, more than three million Americans volunteered for Make A Difference Day, which is sponsored by USA Weekend Magazine in partnership with Pages of Light and Hands on Forward. In Delta, members of Altrus International joined forces with students from the Delta Opportunity School Saturday, Oct. 27, to complete a day of service that the school has an extremely hard-earned. Through a service learning program at the school, the high school students earn credit for being active in the community. Besides earning a possible 100 hours credit by working alongside the Altrusans, teaching lessons and helping out with the flowers, the students also earn credit for their community service work.

"I have always been a volunteer in my life," said DGS teacher Wanda White. "With there are things to do here, and we want to be involved in those things in a service-oriented way."

These Altrusans were completely new to the Delta area, but they have had a deep connection to the school and its community efforts. So with their and

Some last spring, Altrusans have developed a special relationship with the students at Delta Opportunity School.

The partnership began when Altrusans from Denver called to volunteer what they believed to be a good deed. As the partnership unfolded and they learned more about Delta Opportunity School, the deeper the roots of service learning at the school. The work began in the "heart" of Altrus, where they donated books, school supplies and other materials and provided \$150 for additional landscaping materials and DGS first graduation ceremony and reception. In celebration of World Literacy Day, developed by the United Nations, Altrus presented a 1000 books at Delta Opportunity School.

This fall, involvement at Delta Opportunity School has never been deeper. The school's 50 students are all individuals, most with extraordinary circumstances.

"Many of these students are self-sufficient in their life circumstances that require flexibility, so the school uses alternative strategies to help each student become the best of work, family and community," said Altrusans.


